LAS represents individuals in a variety of settings: nursing homes, mental health facilities, residential facilities, and the community. Independent Service Coordination (ISC) provides an array of activities on behalf of individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities and their families/guardians to help them access individualized services and supports. ISC staff serve as an advocate, resource, and partner for the individual, their family, and others who are important in their lives — including service providers. Champaign, Ford, and Iroquois counties are served. Services include the following:

Prioritization of Urgency of Need for Service (PUNS) – provides assistance to individuals with intellectual / developmental disabilities who are potentially in need of services now or within the next five years to register in the PUNS statewide database. Information collected allows the State to categorize needs for developmental disabilities services for individuals.

Pre-Admission Screening (PAS) – provides a screening process to determine whether individuals are eligible for services funded through the Division of Developmental Disabilities, especially those programs that are under the Medicaid waiver. Individuals with intellectual / developmental disabilities that are hospitalized are also screened to determine if nursing home services are appropriate.

Individual Service and Support Advocacy (ISSA) - provides advocacy services to individuals who participate in programs funded by Medicaid waivers (Community Integrated Living Arrangements), developmental training, home-based support, some vocational programs) by Independent Service Coordination staff. ISC staff work with individuals to develop annual Person-Centered Plans, identify goals individuals have for the upcoming year, and monitor implementation of services to address their goals, service provision by provider agencies, and determine service satisfaction. ISC staff also make yearly determinations of continued Medicaid-waiver eligibility for individuals receiving services.

Transition Consultant Services – provides support to individuals with intellectual/ developmental disabilities and their families who are near graduation from secondary education. Transition Consultants assist with education and support regarding the transition to adult based developmental disability services in Illinois. Transition Consultants also assist individuals and families with developing a transition plan and referral/linkage to appropriate community support services.

The Center holds the basic belief that services must be provided in a responsive, flexible, and timely manner. Services will be offered in the best interest of the individual and will address needs as expressed by the individual. Services are provided to individuals age 18 or older who are no longer in high school. Individuals must have a vocational disability and be found eligible for services through the Division of Rehabilitation Services (DRS). Center staff provide referral linkage to DRS. Vocational services offered at The Center include:

Job Development: Individuals are assisted in skills necessary to obtain employment. Skills may include resume building, grooming, appropriate social skills, and interviewing. Job development efforts are based upon plans written in conjunction with the DRS Counselor.

Job Coaching: Individuals receive on-the-job training to promote successful employment. Job coaching is a tiered system developed by DRS. When job coaching is no longer needed, natural supports assist the individual.

Vocational Services are made available through a grant from DRS. Private pay options are available to individuals who do not meet initial criteria or require ongoing support beyond the DRS contract.
